Fire Free Village Program Reduces Fire Incidents in Indonesia

Riau, 22 August 2017 – Four villages in Riau Province and one village in Jambi Province have been rewarded by Asian Agri for their role in reducing the number of national forest fires.

The rewards were presented by Montty Girianna, Deputy for Coordination in Energy, Natural Resources, and Environmental Management, Indonesia Coordinating Ministry for Economic Affairs, to representatives from the villages which successfully prevented fire on their land in the past year.

The five villages - Lubuk Ogong, Lalang Kabung, Delik, and Segati Village in Riau Province, and Lubuk Bernai Village in Jambi province – were part of the Fire Free Village Program. Each received a reward in the form of incentives worth IDR 100,000,000 that can be used for procurement and improvement of fire prevention facilities.

Asian Agri started the Fire Free Village Program in 2016, partnering with seven villages in Riau and two villages in Jambi Province. In 2016, about 7.98 out of 306,664 hectares was burnt, a significant reduction from 13.75 hectares the year before.

"The key success of the reduction of fire is village-level initiatives in fire prevention. As the nearest parties to the potential fire sites, prevention and early anticipation are easier and faster when done by villages, to stop the widespread fires," said Welly Pardede, Asian Agri's Head of Sustainability Operation & CSR.

Montty stated that the synergy between society, companies and villages has always been supported by the government. The partnership scheme is needed to work hand in hand to prevent the negative impact of land fires.

"Land fire is a national disaster and to prevent it requires the participation of all elements of the nation. In this case, the synergy between government, companies, and society is needed to ensure the prevention of forest and land fires can be done optimally," said Montty.
